Recommended Board Action:

Conduct a second Public Hearing on the draft revised voting division map. Following the Public Hearing, consider adopting the proposed voting division map.

Background:

Every 10 years, local government agencies which have voting divisions for their governing body elections must review population data prepared after the federal decennial census to determine if they must redraw their voting division boundaries to reflect how local populations have changed. The key consideration is whether the populations between divisions varies by more than 10 percent. This requirement is provided in Elections Code section 22000 through 22002 and is imposed on the District by Water Code section 30. Elections Code sections 22000 and 22001 require that the District engage customers in the redistricting process by conducting public outreach and to hold at least one Public Hearing on any proposal to adjust voting divisions. Normally, the District is required by Elections Code section 22000 to review and possibly redistrict its Director voting divisions after each federal decennial census. Census data is usually available quickly enough after a census to enable agencies required to redistrict within a year of a census. However, because the COVID pandemic and other factors delayed the compilation and release of 2020 Census data until late summer 2021, the Legislature passed SB 594 last year to permit local agencies to redistrict their voting divisions that are elected at the November statewide general election until April 17, 2022. This is the reason why this issue is being brought to the Board now.

Discussion:

2020 Census Results and Required District Action

The United States 2020 Decennial Census (2020 census) data show that the population within the District's service area grew by 23,215 to 194,444 persons in the period since the prior United States Decennial Census in 2010. The 2020 census data show that the voting divisions now range in population from 37,037 to 40,908, and that the population deviation (the greatest difference between any two Divisions relative to the average ("target") size) is 10 percent. Therefore, in compliance with Elections Code section 22000, adjustments to Directors' voting divisions ("reapportioning") are required.

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The deadline to complete reapportioning is April 17, 2022. To meet this deadline, in compliance with Elections Code section 22001, the following Board actions were conducted at a Special Board meeting held on March 21, 2022; and the following Board actions are to be conducted at a second Special Board meeting held on April 4, 2022, as follows:

A. Special Board Meeting, and Initial Public Hearing – March 21, 2022

- 1. Hold a Public Hearing on the draft voting division map to receive public input on the proposed division boundary adjustments.
- 2. Board considers the proposed voting division map attached to this report and provides any input to staff, taking into consideration public input.
- B. Special Board Meeting, and Final Public Hearing April 4, 2022 Action:
 - 1. Hold second Public Hearing to receive comments on the proposed adoption of revised voting division map.
 - 2. The Board considers adopting a resolution establishing the proposed changes to voting divisions as shown on the proposed or a revised proposed division map.

Proposed Changes to Voting Divisions

Staff has prepared a proposed voting division map depicting the recommended adjustments to four of the five voting divisions for consideration by the Board of Directors and for comment by the public (Attachment 1). The population deviation (greatest relative difference in size between any two voting divisions) in the proposed voting divisions is 1.7%, which is well within the 10 percent deviation permitted under federal and state voting rights law. The proposed adjustments are relatively minor due to the so-called secondary factors the District must consider when adjusting voting division boundaries. These factors include: (1) topography, (2) geography, (3) cohesiveness, contiguity, integrity, and compactness of divisions, and (4) community of interests of each division. Although this is not a factor in drawing the maps, for the Board's information the proposed adjustments would not result in any Director's residence being located outside of their current voting division.

As advised by legal counsel, staff has consulted with the Sacramento County Registrar of Voters' office to review the draft proposed voting division map. Sacramento County Registrar of Voters' staff found that the draft proposed voting division map is acceptable and in compliance with federal and state voting rights and election laws.

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Outreach

SSWD staff conducted thorough outreach to residents and customers, which consisted of:

- 1. <u>Mailer</u> An informational mailing to all residents and property owners within the District boundaries, which amounted to 81,187 mailings. An invitation to learn about the redistricting maps was provided in English, Korean, Tagalog, Chinese (simplified), Spanish, Vietnamese, and Russian.
- 2. <u>Flyer</u> An information flyer was posted at 20 public locations within the District, which included community centers and libraries. A full list of the locations is provided as Attachment 2. An invitation to learn about the draft proposed voting division map was provided in English, Arabic, Korean, Tagalog, Chinese (simplified), Spanish, Vietnamese, and Russian.
- 3. Web page A webpage (linked from the sswd.org home page) was created providing details on the draft proposed voting division map, process, and public comment opportunities. The webpage is available in English, Arabic, Korean, Tagalog, Chinese (simplified), Spanish, Vietnamese, and Russian.
- 4. <u>Advertisement</u> An advertisement was published in the Arden-Carmichael News on Friday, March 11, 2022. An invitation to learn about the proposed voting division map was provided in English, Arabic, Korean, Tagalog, Chinese (simplified), Spanish, Vietnamese, and Russian.
- 5. <u>Media</u> A media release was distributed on March 9, 2022, outlining the upcoming public input opportunities.





Sacramento County Registrar of Voters' staff found that the draft proposed voting division map is acceptable and in compliance with federal and state voting rights and election laws.

As reported at the March 21, 2022, special Board meeting, and at the April 4, 2022 special Board meeting, significant public outreach was conducted. Very little input from the public was received, and as of March 23, 2022, none was relevant to the proposed changes to the voting divisions.

RESOLUTION NO. 22-06

A RESOLUTION OF THE BOARD OF DIRECTORS OF THE SACRAMENTO SUBURBAN WATER DISTRICT REAPPORTIONING DIVISIONS FOR THE ELECTION OF DIRECTORS AFTER THE 2020 FEDERAL CENSUS

WHEREAS, the District, in accordance with the standards provided in the County Water District Law, Water Code sections 30000 and following, and Resolution 04-09, has established a five-member Board of Directors whose members are elected by the residents of each of the five electoral divisions;

WHEREAS, subdivisions (c) and (d) of Water Code section 30733 and Elections Code section 22000 require the District to readjust its electoral divisions as necessary after each federal decennial census:

WHEREAS, the Sacramento County Office of Voter Registration and Elections notified the District that the County would assist the District with reapportioning its electoral divisions using the 2020 federal census data applicable to the District's territory;

WHEREAS, District staff has received 2020 census block data from the Sacramento County Office of Voter Registration and Elections and related assistance and based on that data, has created a proposed map with adjusted electoral divisions that reflect the changes in population of the divisions since the last reapportionment conducted after the 2010 Census; and

WHEREAS, each of the five proposed reapportioned electoral divisions shown on the map attached to and made a part of this resolution as Exhibit A (the "Map") is substantially equal in population, with the largest having a population of 40,908 and the smallest having a population of 37,037, or a deviation of 1.7 percent.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED by the Board of Directors of Sacramento Suburban Water District as follows:

1. The Board makes the following findings:

- A. The reapportioned divisions shown on the Map are as nearly equal in population as practicable. The difference between the division with the smallest population (Division 5) and the division with the largest population (Division 2) is less than 2 percent.
- B. The divisions shown on the Map are reasonably reapportioned in light of the need to ensure the equality of population, and to take into account the irregularity of the District's boundaries and the need to make each division relatively compact and contiguous and to protect communities of interest existing within the divisions, and

therefore the reapportioned divisions comply with the requirements of federal and state voting rights laws.


- C. Division 2, which encompasses McClellan Business Park, while somewhat larger in area than the other electoral divisions in the District, has been appropriately drawn because it is reasonably equal in population with the other divisions. Furthermore, because McClellan lacks any significant population, but is a distinct entity politically and geographically, it should be appended as a whole to one division as a community of interest.
- 2. The reapportioned electoral divisions described on the Map are approved and adopted as shown thereon. The Map is the official delineation of the District's reapportioned electoral divisions for future general district elections, until changed by action of the Board in accordance with the requirements of Elections Code sections 22000 and following and other applicable law.
- 3. The Board authorizes and directs the General Manager or his designee to cooperate with Sacramento County elections officials to fully accomplish the reapportionment of the District's five electoral divisions as shown on the Map, and to ensure that future elections for the District's five elected Directors are held in compliance with the reapportioned districts described therein. The Board further authorizes and directs its the General Manager or his designee to take any actions and execute any documents necessary to implement the reapportionment.



Combination Study - Business Case Analysis

Recommended Board Action:

Review and discuss the proposal/workplan from Raftelis, in the amount of \$155,119, and approve the following, pending legal counsel review:

- 1. Authorize the General Manager to sign a Professional Services Agreement with Raftelis, not to exceed \$155,119.
- 2. Authorize the General Manager to sign a Memorandum of Understanding regarding a Combination Study Business Case Analysis with Carmichael Water District for a 50/50 cost share.

Discussion:

At the October 6, 2021, Joint Board meeting between Carmichael Water District (CWD) and Sacramento Suburban Water District (SSWD), staff was directed to develop a draft Request for Proposal (RFP) for the purpose of conducting a business case analysis of a potential combination between CWD and SSWD. In addition to the RFP, staff was directed to provide an estimated budget to conduct the subject study. Staff estimated the budget for the study at approximately \$200,000.

The respective Boards of CWD and SSWD provided direction to the 2X2 Committee (Committee) to approve the RFP and proceed to distribute it to a pre-selected list of consultants, as well as place the RFP on the districts website.

As reported at the February 2022, regular Board meeting, only one proposal was received by the set deadline. The proposal was submitted by Raftelis with a proposed cost of \$155,119.

The Committee met on February 18, 2022, to discuss the proposal and provide input and direction to staff. Upon agreement of the Committee, the General Managers and two members from the Committee met with Raftelis on March 8, 2022, to finalize the scope of work in order to bring the contract to the respective Boards for potential approval. Based on the outcome of the March 8 meeting, staff and Raftelis continued to develop a final scope of work. The final draft proposal is now ready to be reviewed and recommended to be approved by the CWD and SSWD Board of Directors. CWD has this topic as an action item on the agenda for their April 5, 2022 Special Board meeting.

If both CWD and SSWD approve of the subject analysis, SSWD will be responsible for administering the professional agreement in accordance with SSWD procurement and contracting requirements and procedures. It has been agreed that Dan York shall be the point of contact for the consultant. All direction to the consultant shall be done in cooperation with the General Manager of CWD.

Strategic Business Case Analysis for a Potential Combination

WORKPLAN / MARCH 21, 2022



Study Workplan

Raftelis has developed the following workplan for this study, which is heavily based on our submitted proposal, but includes adjustments based on the comments we received from Carmichael Water District ("CWD") and Sacramento Suburban Water District ("SSWD") or CWD and SSWD together ("the Districts"). It will result in the development of a strategic business case evaluation of a potential combination of the Districts. A key objective will be to objectively frame the business case for each District's Board and stakeholders to help them decide whether or not to proceed with consolidation.

Task 1: Project Initiation and Management

We will use the kick-off meeting to identify important project outcomes and, more importantly, to create a shared vision for this engagement. Our team will meet with the Joint Committee and/or other designated representatives from the Districts to establish projects goals, key tasks and milestones, and non-negotiables, as well as to identify key areas of focus for the review of consolidation of the entities. We will prepare a document/data request for each District to gather important background information, building on the information that we have previously collected during past engagements.

Our team will develop a project plan with communication expectations, a timeline, and a project charter to clearly identify stakeholder expectations, goals, in-scope and out-ofscope activities, success factors and potential risks, key participants, and constraints as a product of the kickoff meeting. Getting buy-in on the project plan from stakeholders will be a critical success factor during and beyond this study if a combination is pursued.

DELIVERABLES:

- Agenda, kick-off meeting materials, and participation
- Project plan with communication expectations, a timeline, and a project charter

Task 2: Describe the Current Environment

Our team will focus on combination alternatives, which will be subjected to analytics necessary to determine how combined finances would impact the fiscal condition of the Districts and what the approximate ratepayer burdens could look like over time following a combination. We will

Combining Water Resources

Evaluating a combination necessitates studying the integration of each Districts' water asset portfolio. Understanding the fundamental principles of the opportunities and restrictions of each water asset is a primary driver to understanding how water supply integration will actually occur.

Our team will recommend a reliable water asset utilization strategy based on a conjunctive use program with the combined water asset from both Districts focusing on issues like climate change and regulatory restrictions under the Bay-Delta Water Plan. The Raftelis team will explain how to effectively use each agencies water assets and provide guidance on cost-effective approaches to water asset management integration in the context of changed future climatological and regulatory conditions.

thoroughly analyze and assess the financial condition and practices of each District to support the combination alternatives. We will review financial documents, including the CAFR and budget at a minimum, and document rate structure, financial policies, asset base, reserve levels, annual revenues, customer volume, pension liabilities, operating expenses, credit ratings, debt capacity, connection fees, and more to ensure equitability for both Districts.

Our team will review and document at a high level how each District operates, including services and programs, service standards, policies and procedures, staffing levels, water resources, structure, governance, costs, and -- something that is often overlooked -- culture. Because of our work on the previous Sacramento Regional Collaboration Study, we are familiar with the two entities which will allow us to expedite some of the data gathering.

DELIVERABLES:

• Impacts at both Districts based on combination alternatives with financial analyses

Task 3: Identify Opportunities and Challenges

We will compare and contrast the operating models of each entity and of a consolidated entity using a strategic business case format. In this phase, we will analyze and identify opportunities and challenges to a combination, including comprehensively assessing the following areas:

- Governance form/structure
- Organizational structure
- Service integration
- Facilities integration
- Financial impacts and challenges of combining Districts
- Staffing opportunities, impacts, and challenges

- Stakeholder and community organization outreach
- Significant water resource implications
- Major regulatory impacts
- Other opportunities and challenges.

For each item above, our team will identify opportunities and challenges associated with the consolidation of the Districts, including costs and benefits (such as net cost savings vs. newly incurred cost burdens to either District), key operational factors that need to be addressed, and more. The analyses will account for scenarios where known and potential future changes create operational impacts (e.g., growth, legislation, , etc.). For governance, we will assess issues of apportionment (representation), customer equality, and equity. This will include recommendations about the structure of a combined governance body and transitional representation during a combination process. For staffing, we will include a discussion of the likely implications with respect to collective bargaining, culture, and staffing. All of these analyses will be informed by information from our work with other clients in the region as a means of comparison.

Raftelis plans to collect data, including interviews, for Tasks 3 and Task 4 using a combination of on-site and virtual data gathering. One trip is scheduled for Tasks 3 and 4.

We will develop a detailed stakeholder and outreach plan that identifies and prioritizes stakeholders, highlights key areas for messaging, and outlines the channels and intensity of engagement by stakeholder group based on their prioritization. Assistance with execution of stakeholder outreach activities is not presently included in the scope.

We will review preliminary observations and recommendations with the Districts and perform any follow-up required to finalize recommendations.

Task 4: Project Deliverables

Once recommendations have been finalized, our team will prepare a comprehensive draft report incorporating our assessments and using data from all project tasks to make recommendations as to how consolidation of the Districts might proceed, and what the costs and efficiencies (together the strategic business case) are likely to be from such a consolidation. The report will include a model (recommended) sequence of activities to achieve a combination, understanding that combination is a process and certain regulatory, financial, and water resource elements may be impacted by outside forces. The draft report will detail the information collected, the analysis conducted, and our recommendations, and make use of creative graphics, tables, and figures to clearly tell the story to a broad audience. To ensure factual accuracy, the entities will have the opportunity to provide one round of consolidated comments. Raftelis will then produce and present a final report.

Raftelis will present its findings and recommendations in person or via a web meeting (if desired by the Districts). This presentation meeting will augment our ongoing virtual check ins and interactions with the Districts and 2x2 Committee that will occur roughly monthly to provide updates and get feedback. We are available for additional in person or virtual meetings to present findings and recommendations beyond what is described, as an amendment to the scope of work.


