Items for Discussion and Action

1. Review and Discuss a Scope of Services, Schedule and Potential Legal Firms to Render Opinion Regarding San Juan Water District Water Rights and Contracts GM Roscoe summarized the Request for Proposal.

Chair Schild voiced his concern regarding Director Wichert's absence and suggested adjourning the meeting. Staff responded that there could not be more than two directors but that one director could still conduct the meeting. Chair Schild also voiced his concern that the District had not reviewed the contracts before this point in time.

There was discussion related to the different water rights contracts and service contracts, which contract covered the surplus CVP water, what limitations in water use there may be if the two districts either merged or didn't merge, and other questions that the selected legal firm could potentially answer for the District.

Chair Schild voiced his concerns regarding the cost for outside legal counsel as well as with making a decision without the other Committee member. Staff responded that sending out the Request for Proposal did not commit money; it would only ask those firms that may be interested in working with the District to submit their qualifications. Brenda Washington Davis stated the Board had already approved the formation of the Committee to have this

review performed. Mr. Eubanks stated that it was Chair Schild that had requested this review be done. Mr. Eubanks did not see a problem with proceeding with receiving qualifications.

Other non-substantial changes in wording were discussed.

Chair Schild directed staff to change the Request for Proposal to Request for Qualifications (RFQ), to forward a copy of the staff report to Director Wichert and give Director Wichert 24 hours to respond with his edits or comments. If Director Wichert had no changes, staff was to move forward with sending out the RFQs.

Ms. Zolezzi evaluated the potential reorganization and merger of the Stockton East Water District with Central San Joaquin Water Conservation District. This work culminated in obtaining special legislation to govern the newly consolidated district [See AB 1172 2009 and Water Code §74200.5], as well as review of the CVP contracts held by each district for ability to use water supplies under the contracts in the newly consolidated district.

For nearly 30 years, Ms. Zolezzi has worked on conjunctive use projects for the district, and is currently completing CEQA review for a Water Supply Enhancement Project that will utilize newly acquired wet year surface water supplies to recharge a long-term average of 75,000 acre feet annually on over 6,000 acres of recharge basins and flooded fields within the district.

Patterson Irrigation District and Banta-Carbona Irrigation both hold pre-1914 rights to the San Joaquin River, as well as CVP contracts for supplemental water supplies. In addition, PID holds a settlement right contract with the Bureau of Reclamation. Ms. Zolezzi has provided evaluations of and recommendations regarding the use, maximization and protection of these pre-1914 rights. Most recently, Ms. Zolezzi had taken an aggressive position with the State Water Resources Control Board limiting its ability to regulate and curtail pre-1914 rights during the current drought.

Solano County Water Agency holds a State Water Project Contract, and Ms. Zolezzi has negotiated numerous amendments over the years to that contract. In addition, Ms. Zolezzi recently completed settlement of area-of-origin litigation brought by the Agency and other SWP contractors against the Department of Water Resources.

Ms. Zolezzi is currently working with the Improvement District to merge with the Redwood Valley Water District and addresses issues both with the Local Agency Formation

documents, travel time, case analysis, and all time spent in court and in depositions and other discovery proceedings. The firm bills in increments of 6 minutes (0.1) per hour.

In addition to fees, we will charge clients for all costs and expenses we incur in performing our services, including, without limitation, expenses for photocopying, messenger and delivery services, computerized research, videotape recording, travel (including mileage, parking, airfare, lodging, meals, tips and ground transportation), and all court costs and filing fees. The firm also includes a "communication fee" of 2% of the fees charged (exclusive of costs and expenses) in bills for telephone, long distance, fax, email and electronic research rather than itemize such expenses.

A copy of Herum\Crabtree\Suntag's legal services agreement is included.

Based on the description of the work included in the Scope of Work, it appears that the documents can be reviewed and an opinion letter prepared in under twenty hours. Based upon Ms. Zolezzi's hourly rate, therefore, our estimate is a legal fee from \$5,000.00 to \$7,500.00 for the initial review and opinion.

5. Information on the availability of the principal attorney and an estimate of the duration of time required.

While Ms. Zolezzi's time is in demand, she will make herself available to provide the requested services to Sacramento-Suburban Water District. It appears that the initial work would include a review of exiting water rights of the San Juan Water District, as well as a review of their contracts and entitlements, and a review of the opinions rendered by Bartkiewicz, Kronick and Shanahan. Presuming the documents are provided in a timely manner, initial review and preparation of a summary memo should not take more than two weeks.

Biography

Jeanne M. Zolezzi is a recognized expert in California Water Rights. This expertise is acknowledged by her leadership role in the American Bar Association and Association of California Water Agencies. Her practice includes counseling, administrative matters and water rights litigation. For twenty-five years she has represented public agency and private clients in the acquisition and confirmation of water rights. She handles state and federal litigation against the State Water Resources Control Board and the United States Bureau of Reclamation.

Ms. Zolezzi represented Castaic Lake Water Agency when it implemented the first whole-sale purchase of a district receiving water from the State Water Project; she negotiated and documented the purchase of and transfer of water from the Devil's Den Water District in Kern County to Castaic Lake Water Agency. Ms. Zolezzi routinely negotiates water transfers from her agricultural clients to water users through the State of California.

Ms. Zolezzi has appeared as amicus curie before the Nevada Supreme Court, arguing that the public trust doctrine should be affirmatively applied to Nevada water rights adjudication matters.

Ms. Zolezzi represented the plaintiff in a rare water right adjudication of a stream: Putah Creek in Solano County. The litigation involved hundreds of parties and included lands within Lake, Solano and Yolo Counties. After a decade of litigation, she was able to successfully settle all aspects of the litigation and develop a working partnership among the United States, local governmental agencies and private water right holders.

Representing clients that hold water supply contracts with the United States, Ms. Zolezzi has negotiated renewals of those contracts with the federal government, and processed the CEQA and NEPA documentation required for their approval, guaranteeing a continued long-term water supply to thousands of acres of land. She is currently in litigation with the United States over implementation of the Central Valley Project Improvement Act and its injury to water users within the watersheds of origin in San Joaquin County.

Ms. Zolezzi acts is currently lead counsel for a group of State Water Project contractor Plaintiffs demanding that the State of California recognize their priority to Project water because of their county and watershed or origin status.

In addition to her practice in Natural Resources, Ms. Zolezzi undertakes title and environmental review for the annual acquisition of millions of dollars of agricultural property for clients throughout the western United States.

During law school, Ms. Zolezzi was an intern for Justice Stanley Mosk of the California Supreme Court. Ms. Zolezzi is a fifth generation San Joaquin County farmer, and her family has farmed in that area for over 100 years. She continues to live on orchard lands that she farms with her husband and three children.

Ms. Harrigfeld is retained to find solutions to complex infrastructure controversies threatening the successful developing and siting of proposed public facilities and private projects. For example, Ms. Harrigfeld was instrumental in negotiating for and creating the public agency structure to govern the massive Mountain House Community, the first new town community in Northern California. This effort resulted in Ms. Harrigfeld drafting legislation authorizing the Mountain House Community Services District, a unique community services district having many of the governmental powers traditional exercised by cities. In addition, Ms. Harrigfeld has led the development team in resolving water acquisition and waste water infrastructure questions for the new community.

Ms. Harrigfeld represents clients before many administrative agencies, including the Public Utilities Commission, the State Water Resources Control Board and the Regional Water Quality Control Boards on water rights and quality matters. She has been extensively involved in working with the Central Valley Region in establishing a salinity and boron objectives for the San Joaquin River. Right Options, Limitations and Opportunities

Dear Mr. Roscoe:

Thank you for considering Duane Morris LLP as counsel to provide legal advice relative regarding San Juan Water District's (SJWD) ability to provide Sacramento Suburban Water District with access to present surface water rights or contract supplies. Based on your RFQ, we understand the assignment to primarily be to provide a second opinion to that of Bartkiewicz, Kronick and Shanahan (BKS) regarding SJWD's rights relative to using their surface water outside of their existing boundaries. We are of course familiar with BKS, having worked with or opposite them on any number of matters over the years. Our familiarity with that firm will not impede our ability to provide you with an independent and critical examination of their opinion as well as the scope of the existing SJWD water rights, contracts and entitlements.

We understand the final scope of work will be negotiated. The scope of work will largely dictate the cost for providing the legal analysis as it is not possible at this time to ascertain with any degree of precision what the work will entail. With that limitation in mind, we endeavor to provide you with the following responses to the issues raised in your RFQ.

3. Information on any Potential Conflicts. Note that this is a key issue as federal contracts are to be reviewed for limitations and opportunities. Specifically list any clients that hold CVP or SWP contracts and specifically list any greater Sacramento region clients.

DM does not represent any water agencies within the Greater Sacramento region. We have or currently do represent clients that hold CVP or SWP contracts.

For many years, we represented the Santa Clara Valley Water District regarding CVP contract renewal. Through this representation, we became intimately familiar with the issues surrounding the CVP contracts, interests of M&I water users, issues pertaining to M&I as compared to agricultural water contractors, issues pertaining to the American River, and others germane to CVP contract renewal. We also represent the San Joaquin River Exchange Contractors and the Central California Irrigation District, both of which hold exchange contracts with the Bureau of Reclamation. Technically, they are not considered CVP contractors in the sense of either water service or repayment contracts. The exchange contracts are unique but are similar to the settlement contracts in the Sacramento Valley.

Regarding entities with SWP contracts, we have represented the SWC, Inc. for many years on the relicensing of the Oroville Hydroelectric Project and some other matters. We also have represented a number of SWP contractors including Alameda County Water District, Kern County Water Agency, Metropolitan Water District of Southern California, and Santa Clara Valley Water District.

4. Fee Schedule and Rough Estimate of What may be Expected for Total Fee, Given that the Final Scope of Work will be Negotiated

As indicated in the introductory comments responding to the RFQ, without knowing the scope of work, it is very difficult to give any meaningful estimate of total fees. Our current rates to governmental entities for 2015 are \$500 an hour for Mr. Berliner and \$435 an hour for Ms. Ansley. We would expect that this work could be performed in 60-90 days. Part of assessing the timeframe within which this work is to be performed is dependent upon the complexity of the issues raised, the degree to which the client is able to supply necessary documents, whether any additional documents search needs to be conducted, and client expectations or needs. We expect that the work would likely cost somewhere between \$50,000-\$100,000.

5. Information on the Availability of the Principal Attorney and an Estimate of the Duration of Time Required

Both Mr. Berliner and Ms. Ansley are available to perform this work. While we have other responsibilities, we are diligent and responsive. As such, we will make the time necessary to provide a thorough and comprehensive assessment of the water rights to be considered.

At the March 4, 2015 Ad Hoc Water Rights Review, staff presented a Draft Request for Proposals which included a brief description of the Scope of Work (see Exhibit 1).

The attorney solicitation was largely based on qualifications and potential conflicts with the scope of work to be negotiated with selected firm. Staff would like input from the Committee on the appropriate level of review of San Juan Water District's water rights, contracts and/or entitlements. Staff anticipates taking Committee direction on the scope of services, negotiate a legal services contract, and bringing that contract to the April regular Board meeting for approval.

Legal review of water rights options, limitations and opportunities

Background

For the past three years, the Sacramento Suburban Water District (SSWD) and the San Juan Water District (SJWD) have been in discussions regarding how to increase water supply reliability for their customers. SJWD serves water to customers in northeast Sacramento County and south Placer county, including wholesale water services to Citrus Heights Water District, Fair Oaks Water District, Orange Vale Water Company and the portion of the City of Folsom north of the American River. SJWD relies on surface water from Folsom Lake. SSWD serves retail customers in north Sacramento county, operating a conjunctive use water supply with access to surface water only in wet years and wet times, relying solely on groundwater in dry times.

Both districts have perceived an erosion of water supply reliability in recent years. For SJWD, federal operations at Folsom Reservoir have resulted in nearly exposing the drinking water intakes that are the only present source of surface water. Projections for future operations indicate Folsom Reservoir may be drawn to below drinking water intakes more frequently than previously assumed. For SSWD, continued reliable access to contracted surface water supplies for conjunctive use purposes appears to be at greater risk with new temperature and flow requirements in the lower American river and potential changes in in-stream flow requirements associated with relicensing of upstream hydroelectric projects. Continued access to surface water supplies for conjunctive use is important for maintaining groundwater sustainability goals set by the Sacramento Groundwater Authority and those that will be required by the new Sustainable Groundwater Management Act of 2014.

One of the options the districts are investigating is a potential merger or consolidation or reorganization (hereafter "merger"), where all water resources assets of both districts would be managed by a single public agency under a single elected Board of Directors. It is believed that such an arrangement could increase overall water supply reliability through allowing the present SJWD area to access to SSWD groundwater resources, and allowing the present SSWD area more reliable access to surface water for conjunctive use purposes.

Both Districts contract with Bartkiewicz, Kronick and Shanahan (BKS) for General Counsel Legal Services. SJWD has requested a legal opinion from BKS on SJWD's rights relative to using their surface water outside their existing boundaries. SJWD holds pre-1914 water rights, a CVP Contract, and a contract to purchase water from Placer County Water Agency (PCWA). As access to surface water from SJWD is central to future decisions on whether or not the districts should continue to discuss merging, the SSWD Board of Directors would like to engage an independent, second opinion from qualified outside counsel. It is expected that the selected person or firm would provide legal advice relative to the ability of SJWD, either with or without merging of the districts, to provide SSWD access to present surface water rights or contract supplies.

Scope of Work

While the final scope of work will be negotiated with the selected counsel, it is expected to include a review of existing SJWD water rights, contracts and entitlements (information will be provided by SJWD), and a review of opinions presented by BKS. SSWD would like to know if this review results in concurrence with the BKS opinions, or, if not, why not.

Proposal Requirements

Please include the following information in your proposal.

- General firm background, contact information, and the name and qualifications
 of the principal attorney to conduct the work, and the office location where the
 work will be performed.
- 2. Representative clients and similar work performed by the principal attorney to be assigned.
- 3. Information on any potential conflicts. Note that this is a key issue as federal contracts are to be reviewed for limitations and opportunities. Specifically list any clients that hold CVP or SWP contracts, and specifically list any greater Sacramento region clients.
- 4. Fee schedule and a rough estimate of what may be expected for total fee, given that the final scope of work will be negotiated.
- 5. Information on the availability of the principal attorney and an estimate of the duration of time required.
